

## Common Concerns

For the first time in more than 15 years, your City Council and County Commission are conducting joint meetings to discuss issues of common concern. Although it is normal for the staff of both agencies to work on common matters, the joint meetings of the two legislative bodies represent a commitment “at the top” of both organizations to seek mutually acceptable solutions. Because the Pasco urban area contains three-quarters of the total county population, it is increasingly important that the two agencies have mutual understanding of the urban issues.

The primary issues of discussion relate to the “growing pains” in the southern portion of the County and the opportunities to jointly resolve them. In particular, the county’s need for more jail beds is important for the city to sustain its low crime rate and is a benefit to all citizens, regardless of city boundaries. Though the county is solely responsible for housing felons (rape, murder, etc.), the city needs jail beds available to house those incarcerated for lesser crimes, like domestic violence, DUI, theft, assault, and so on. And the city needs space to continue operating its municipal court, as its 40-year lease at the courthouse will expire in 2012; if the county is to add jail space in the next few years, it should be more cost effective for the city to pay for municipal court space at the courthouse, rather than build a separate building blocks away from the jail.

Another issue of common concern is the development rules required by the county for new development in that portion of West Pasco that is

not yet in the city. If the county requires the same standards used by the city, then the city (and its taxpayers) will not have to spend scarce public dollars to upgrade the streets, utilities and parks after future annexation.

How to address an aging emergency communication system continues to be a common concern of both the county sheriff and city’s police and fire departments. Any long-term solution will require associated funding and identifying the most cost-effective solution is paramount for both the city and county, keeping in mind the county system must provide service from Pasco to Connell and Kahlotus and everywhere in between. And the ability to have a meaningful role in those decisions is of growing importance to the city, because it shoulders the largest share of the county-wide emergency communications budget each year.

These and other issues of common concern will be discussed by the City Council and County Commission this year. It is an important and very positive effort by both agencies to identify the best solutions to some thorny problems, ultimately benefiting citizens of Pasco - all of whom are citizens of Franklin County.

### Library Remodel

The Pasco library has been closed since December 31, 2008 for remodeling, and was re-opened March 21st. The project doubles the library's number of public internet access computers, from 17 to a total of 34. The library will also receive new décor, paint, furnishings, energy-efficient windows, library materials (\$70,000 worth), and a server room. The library is owned by the City of Pasco and has been operated by Mid-Columbia Libraries since 1973. The 1962 facility last upgraded in 1999.
